From the Superintendent's Desk

I'm looking forward to working with students, teachers, staff members, parents, and community members in having Maywood Public School provide the best possible education that it can.

We have several new staff members that we would like to welcome to Maywood. Victoria Armstrong will be the new agriculture teacher and is excited about working with the FFA. Theresa Coyle will be teaching high school math and her work ethic will be great for our students. Lastly, Phyllis Johnson will bring years of teaching experience into the K-12 special education area. I look forward to working with these people in making their subject areas and the entire school the best it can be!

Maywood Public School would like to invite all of our students, parents, and community members to our Back to School Bash on Monday, August 18, from 6:00-7:30 p.m. This is an opportunity for the students to bring supplies for the coming school year and for parents and community members to come in and see the school classrooms. We hope to see you all here on the 18th.

A big THANK YOU goes to the summer employees for working so hard to make the improvements we see in our school building and having everything ready to go for the school year. Thank you to Mike Evans, Deb Covey, Chris Doxon, Barb Fritsche, Charles Jones, and Jon Snider for all of your hard work.

There will be two primary areas that the teachers will receive training during the upcoming school year. The first will take place during the August in-service time with updates as necessary during the year. Write-Tools is a writing program that we will be incorporated in all curricular areas and from Kindergarten through the 12th grade. Writing isn't just taught in English class, but is really a skill that should be used in every area. We are working with all teachers on a systematic and uniform way to teach writing. The other training the teachers will be taking part in is an E.S.U. #15 wide program for Professional Learning Communities. These "communities" allow teachers of the same grade level or curricular area to meet and discuss common thoughts, issues, or concerns with teachers from E.S.U. #15 schools. This kind of sharing can broaden a teacher's knowledge base and create a network they can use for future reference.

Students in grades 9-12 will be receiving their laptop computers and I would like to take this opportunity to remind parents that it is all right for you to see what is on their child's computer. In fact, we highly recommend that this happen! Help ensure that your child is using their computer in a safe, educational way at home. We can monitor what they do at school, however, once they go home to an unsecured network they can go anywhere on the web and do anything. Also, please remember that part of the student laptop program is a \$250 deductible that the student and/or parent/guardian is responsible for if a student's computer is damaged and needs repair. This deductible will be billed if it is determined that the damage is the fault of the student and not just from normal use. In addition, students in grades 6-8 will also have a school assigned laptop computer to use at school. These computers will remain at school and the students will not be allowed to take them home with them.

Teachers will be having teacher workdays and in-service training Tuesday-Friday, August 12-15, and Monday, August 18. The first day of classes will be on Tuesday, August 19, with lunch being served and school dismissing at 1:00 p.m. on that day.

Lunch prices are as follows: Preschool—\$2.25, K—5th grade \$2.40, 6th—12th \$2.75, Adults \$3.75 & reduced lunches are \$.40. Extra milk for lunch or milk break will be \$.40.

KIDS Connection

Nebraska Kids connection program is a Medicaid expansion and provides health care coverage to uninsured children age 18 and younger living in families with income below poverty levels. The program is designed to provide routine, preventive health care, basic hospitalization and specialty care as needed. Dear Parent/Guardian:

CHILDREN NEED HEALTHY MEALS TO LEARN. MAYWOOD PUBLIC SCHOOL OFFERS HEALTHY MEALS EVERY SCHOOL DAY, LUNCH COSTS: PRESCHOOL - \$2.25, KINDERGARTEN - \$2.40, 5TH GRADE - \$2.40, 6TH GRADE - \$2.75 AND ADULTS - \$3.75. YOUR CHILDREN MAY QUALIFY FOR FREE MEALS OR FOR REDUCED-PRICE MEALS. REDUCED-PRICE IS \$.40 FOR LUNCH.

If your child(ren) qualified for free or reduced-price meals at the end of last school year, you must submit a new application by Monday, September 29, 2014, in order to avoid an interruption in meal benefits.

Frequently asked questions and answers:

Do I need to fill out an application for each child?

No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced-price meals. *Use one Free and Reduced-Price School Meals Application for all students in your household.* We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. **Return the completed application to: Trent Benjamin at Maywood School, P.O. Box 46 Maywood, NE 69038.**

Who can get free meals?

All children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) or Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) can get free meals regardless of your income. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.

Can foster children get free meals?

Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income.

Can homeless, runaway and migrant children get free meals?

Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told your children will get free meals, please contact Kim Stengel at Maywood Public School, P.O. Box 46, Maywood, NE 69038 to see if they qualify.

Who can get reduced price meals?

Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart shown with this application.

Should I fill out an application if I received a letter this school year saying my children are approved for free meals?

Please read the letter carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at (308) 362-4223 if you have questions.

My child's application was approved last year for meal benefits. Do I need to fill out another one? Yes, your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.

I receive WIC. Can my child(ren) get free meals?

Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please fill out an application.

Will the information I give be checked?

Yes, we may ask you to send written proof.

If I don't qualify now, may I apply later?

Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free or reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.

What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application?

You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: Mike Williams at P.O. Box 46, Maywood Public School, Maywood, NE 69038 or (308)362-4223.

May I apply if someone in my household is not a U.S. citizen?

Yes. You or your child(ren) do not have to be U.S. citizens to qualify for free or reduced price meals.

Who should I include as members of my household?

You must include all people living in your household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives or friends) who share income and expenses. You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.

What if my income is not always the same?

List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you make \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.

We are in the military. Do we include our housing allowance as income?

If you get an off-base housing allowance, it must be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income.

My spouse is deployed to a combat zone. Is his combat pay counted as income?

No, if the combat pay is received in addition to his basic pay because of his deployment and it wasn't received before he was deployed, combat pay is not included as income. Contact your school for more information.

My family needs more help. Are there other programs we might apply for?

Instructions for Completing the Free & Reduced Priced School Meals Family Application

If your household receives benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), follow these instructions:

- Part 1:** List each child's name, the school they attend and their grade.
- Part 2:** Enter household's Master Case Number if the household qualifies for SNAP, TANF or FDPIR.
- Part 3:** Skip this part.
- Part 4:** Sign the form. The last four digits of a Social Security Number do not need to be reported.
- Part 5:** Answer this question if you choose to.

If you are applying for a FOSTER CHILD, follow these instructions:

If all children in the household are foster children:

- Part 1:** List all foster children, the school they attend and their grade. Check the box indicating the child is a foster child.
- Part 2:** Skip this part.
- Part 3:** Skip this part.
- Part 4:** Sign the form. The last four digits of a Social Security Number do not need to be reported.
- Part 5:** Answer this question if you choose to.

If some of the children in the household are foster children:

- Part 1:** List all children, including foster children, the school they attend and their grade. Check the box if the child is a foster child.

Use of Information Statement: This explains how we will use the information you give us.

The Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act requires the information on this application. You do not have to give the information, but if you do not, we cannot approve your child for free or reduced price meals. You must include the last four digits of the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. The last four digits of the social security number are not required when you apply on behalf of a foster child or you list a Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Program or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) case number or other FDPIR identifier for your child or when you indicate that the adult household member signing the application does not have a social security number. We will use your information to determine if your child is eligible for free or reduced price meals and for administration and enforcement of the lunch and breakfast programs. We MAY share your eligibility information with education, health and nutrition programs to help them evaluate, fund or determine benefits for their programs, auditors for program reviews and law enforcement officials to help them look into violations of program rules.

Non-Discrimination Statement: This explains what to do if you believe you have been treated unfairly.

Computing Income for Self-Employed Individuals

Individuals who are self-employed or engaged in farming may experience variations in cash flow and cannot easily report a monthly income. These individuals may use their 2013 U.S. Individual Income Tax Return Form 1040 to report self-employment income for the free and reduced price meal application. The income to be recorded is income derived from the business venture less operating costs incurred in the generation of that income. Deductions for personal expenses such as interest on home mortgages, medical expenses and other similar non-business items are not allowed in reducing gross business income.

USDA has announced that losses (negative numbers) on the lines listed below can be used to determine the total income for this attachment. If the total income is a negative number, it must then be recorded as zero on the application in the category labeled "All Other Income". Zero income resulting from the use of Form 1040 does not require follow-up.

Please note: Line 7 cannot be reported as current income. Income from wages or salaries must be reported on the application for the most recent month.

Line 22 (total income) and line 37 (adjusted gross income) may be used for purposes of applying for free and reduced-priced meals.

The required information for determining the allowable income from self-employment is to be taken from the 2013 U.S. Individual Income Tax Return Form 1040.
