



MAYWOOD PUBLIC SCHOOL NEWSLETTER

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As summer comes to a close again, we would like to welcome all students and staff back to Maywood Public Schools. I hope all of you had a tremendous summer and found time for some rest, relaxation, and fun. Here at school there have been some exciting things going on. Mrs. Covey had her summer reading program and students of all ages were in and out of the building most of the summer for the activities she had planned. The elementary teachers have been busy planning and working with the new reading series WONDERS that was purchased for PK-6th grade students. There are many new features to the WONDERS series that will help to enhance the students' capabilities in reading. Our staff was involved in a triad PLC (professional learning community) process with Hayes Center and Wauneta-Palisade teachers. Last school year we broke ground with this PLC group to help our teachers have a small group to work together within their same content area. The teachers started the process in May by working with their colleagues from the other two districts. This process has been a great experience and one that is going to benefit the students greatly. Many of the teachers at the high school and junior high level have been working with their activities and groups this summer to help them be better prepared for the school year. The coaches have been working hard with the student-athletes throughout the summer with weight room workouts, individual workout, summer leagues and camps. It is great to see the efforts of the students and staff to make sure MPS is succeeding.

There will be some new faces around the school building this upcoming school year. Mr. Lucas McCain will be the PK-12 principal. He grew up in Fremont and had prior teaching experience at Arlington and Logan View. Mr. McCain and his wife Olivia, have two children, Parker and Brooks. Whitney Kleiwer, soon to be Whitney van Zyl, is the new music/band instructor. She recently has been teaching at a school of similar size to Maywood in Montana. She brings multiple years of teaching experience to MPS. Whitney has great ideas to bring to the music department. Caitlyn Jacobson will be teaching 2nd grade. Caitlyn has taught at Arthur County and North Platte Public schools for multiple years. Caitlyn has shown a strong work ethic and is a teacher who is highly involved with her students on a daily basis. We welcome these new staff members and look forward to having a great school year.

There are a few important dates to remember as the school year gets going. Back to School Night Open House is August 14th from 5:30-6:30 p.m. This is open to all students, staff, parents, and community members. Please stop by and see the improvements that have been made to the school and see your child's classrooms and teachers. The first day of school is August 15th; this will be a 1:00 p.m. dismissal, breakfast and lunch will be served. Just as a reminder, school is dismissed at 2:30 p.m. on all Fridays. The breakfast program will now be running each school day. Students are invited to participate in the breakfast and lunch program. The prices are the following: breakfast, student - \$1.65, reduced student - \$.30, adult - \$2.65; lunch, Pre-K \$2.50, K-5 \$2.75, 6-12 \$3.00; reduced lunch price is \$.40, and adult price is \$3.75.

An important policy update due to statute change from the Nebraska Legislature is the passing of LB 1081 which created the Nebraska Reading Improvement Act. This statute does not go into effect until the 19-20 school year, but will have an immediate effect on school districts. In the 19-20 school year, schools must administer approved reading assessments by the Nebraska Department of Education three times a year. This is to help students with deficiencies in reading and try to make sure they are on grade level by the end of the third grade. All students who test below grade level will be given reading interventions and summer course work which can be online. Parents will be notified by the school if their child or children are not on grade level. Notification will be by a letter, electronic message, or phone call.

Handbook changes for the 2018-19 school year:

Cheating, Plagiarism, and Academic Dishonesty

Students may not cheat, plagiarize, or otherwise participate in any academic dishonesty in any form. Prohibited behaviors include:

1. Obtaining, attempting to obtain, or aiding another person to obtain credit for work by any dishonest or deceptive means.
2. Lying.
3. Copying another person's work or answers.
4. Discussing the answers or questions on a test or assignment unless specifically authorized by the teacher.
5. Taking or receiving copies of a test without the permission of the teacher.
6. Using or displaying notes, "cheat sheets," or other sources of unauthorized information.
7. Submitting work or any portion of work completed by another person.
8. Failing to give credit for ideas, statements, facts, conclusions which rightfully belong to another person.

Failing to use quotation marks or other appropriate means of attribution when quoting directly from another person or source. A student who cheats, plagiarizes, or otherwise participates in any academic dishonesty is subject to discipline, up to and including expulsion.

Reporting Student Law Violations

1. In an effort to demonstrate that student behavior is always subject to possible legal sanctions regardless of where the behavior occurs, an administrator or his/her designee from Maywood Public School may notify the proper legal authorities when a student engages in any of the following behaviors on school grounds or at a school sponsored event:
 - a. The violation includes possession of a firearm;
 - b. The violation results in child abuse;
 - c. It is a violation of state law that the administration believes cannot be adequately addressed by discipline from the school district.
 - d. It is a violation of state law that endangers the health and welfare of staff or students; or
 - e. It is a violation of state law that interferes with school purposes.

Chromebook and General Precautions

Students are responsible for keeping their individual Chromebook in their possession at all times. Unattended Chromebooks will be turned into Mrs. Carey. Students will need to complete a written action plan to correct their inattentive behavior of school-owned equipment. Upon appropriate completion of the action plan the Chromebook will be returned to the student. Consequences will increase with repeat offenses. Students are solely responsible for their individually issued Chromebook and can at no time be responsible for another Chromebook that has not been issued to them. Any Chromebook found by a student must be turned into a teacher immediately.

Title I Update

The school district recognizes the unique needs of students who are being served in its Title I program, and the importance of parent and family engagement in the Title I program. Parent and family engagement in the Title I Program shall include, but is not limited to:

1. An annual meeting, to which all parents of participating children will be invited to inform parents of their school's participation to explain the requirements and the right of the parents to be involved. Invitations may take the form of notes sent with students or announcements in the school newsletter. Additional meetings may be scheduled, based upon need and interest for such meetings.

2. An explanation of the details for the child's and parents' participation, including but not limited to: curriculum objectives, the forms of academic assessment used to measure student progress and the achievement levels of the challenging State academic standards, type and extent of participation, parental input in educational decisions, coordination and integration with other Federal, State, and district programs, and evaluations of progress.
3. Opportunities for participation in parent involvement activities such as training to help parents work with their children to improve achievement. A goal of parent activities is to provide parents with opportunities to participate in decisions relating to the education of their students, where appropriate.
4. The district will, to the extent practicable, provide parents of limited English proficiency, parents with disabilities, parents with limited literacy, are economically disadvantaged, are of a racial or minority background or parents of migratory children with opportunities for involvement in the Title I Program. Communication to parents about student progress and the district's other Title I Program communications will be provided in the language used in the home to the extent practicable. Responses to parent concerns will be provided in a timely manner.
5. Opportunities for parent-teacher conferences, in addition to those regularly scheduled by the school district, if requested by the parents or as deemed necessary by school district staff.
6. The district will coordinate and integrate parental involvement programs and activities with other programs in the community. These may include cooperation with other community programs such as Head Start and preschools and other community services such as the public library.
7. Educate teachers, specialized instructional support personnel, principals, and other school leaders, with the assistance of parents in the value and utility of contributions of parents, how to reach out to, communicate with and work with parents as equal partners.

Student Fees

Materials Required for Course Projects. The school district will provide students with the materials necessary to complete all basic curricular projects. In courses where students choose to produce a project that requires materials beyond the basic materials provided by the district, the student will either furnish the materials, purchase the materials from the school, or purchase the materials from an outside vendor with an order form provided by the school district. The student fees for Industrial Technology for 8th grade students was set at \$40 and 7th grade students at \$30.

Fall activities will be starting soon and all students participating in fall sports will need to have a current physical on file in the school office and an NSAA form signed and on file in the school office. This is required for all junior high and high school students. Students that are in the 7th, 9th, and 11th grade participating in sports will also be required to take the IMPACT test (concussion awareness). This is done at the school and is read by Great Plains Sports Medicine out of North Platte. Please call the office if you have questions about these forms or the IMPACT test. The activity schedule is posted on the Maywood Public Schools website and is also being printed for parents and patrons.

As the school year starts, I am looking forward to getting the students and staff back in the building and getting school underway. The excitement of a new school year and the energy the students bring to the building is fantastic. I hope everyone will have the opportunity to come to the back to school night on August 14th from 5:30-6:30. If you ever have questions or concerns or just want to stop by the school, please do so. The first day of school is Wednesday, August 15, 2018 with a 1:00 p.m. dismissal. Breakfast and lunch will be served. Classes begin at 8:00 a.m. on regular days and will be dismissed at 3:45 p.m. School will be dismissed on Fridays at 2:30 p.m.

Breakfast and Lunch Program

We encourage everyone to participate in the breakfast and lunch program as increased participation results in increased state and federal money available to our school. All accounts need to be paid in advance. Every month you will receive a statement of your account—please pay promptly. For your convenience Maywood Public Schools accepts Visa, MasterCard and Discover. Breakfast is served daily from 7:30 a.m. to 7:50 a.m. Breakfast prices are \$1.65 and the reduced price for breakfast is \$.30. There are no seconds for breakfasts. Lunch prices are as follows: Preschool—\$2.50, K—5th grade \$2.75, 6th—12th \$3.00, Adults \$3.75 and reduced lunches are \$.40. Extra milk for lunch or milk break will be \$.40. Second helpings of the main dish and dessert are \$.75 each. Your child's lunch account will be charged for any seconds taken, this includes those receiving free and reduced lunches. Fruits and vegetables are free. If you do not want your child to receive seconds, please call the school at 308-362-4223.

KIDS Connection

Nebraska Kids connection program is a Medicaid expansion and provides health care coverage to uninsured children age 18 and younger living in families with income below poverty levels. The program is designed to provide routine, preventive health care, basic hospitalization and specialty care as needed. It's called **EZMealApp**. This website allows parents to apply for meal benefits online and it's confidential. No one sees you or your child with a paper form. The private data is securely transmitted to the district child nutrition department allowing quick application review.

You don't have to register, there is no username or password to remember, and your online application is only viewable by authorized users.

Click on the Quick Links tab on the Maywood School home page. Scroll down to EZMealApp and click on this option. If you have any problems please call the school office at 308-362-4223. If you need a paper application, stop by the school office to pick an application up or we can mail one to you. If your child(ren) qualified for free or reduced price meals at the end of last school year, you must submit a new application by **October 1, 2018** in order to avoid an interruption in meal benefits. Any applications completed before June 30, 2018 will not be considered for the 2018-2019 school year.

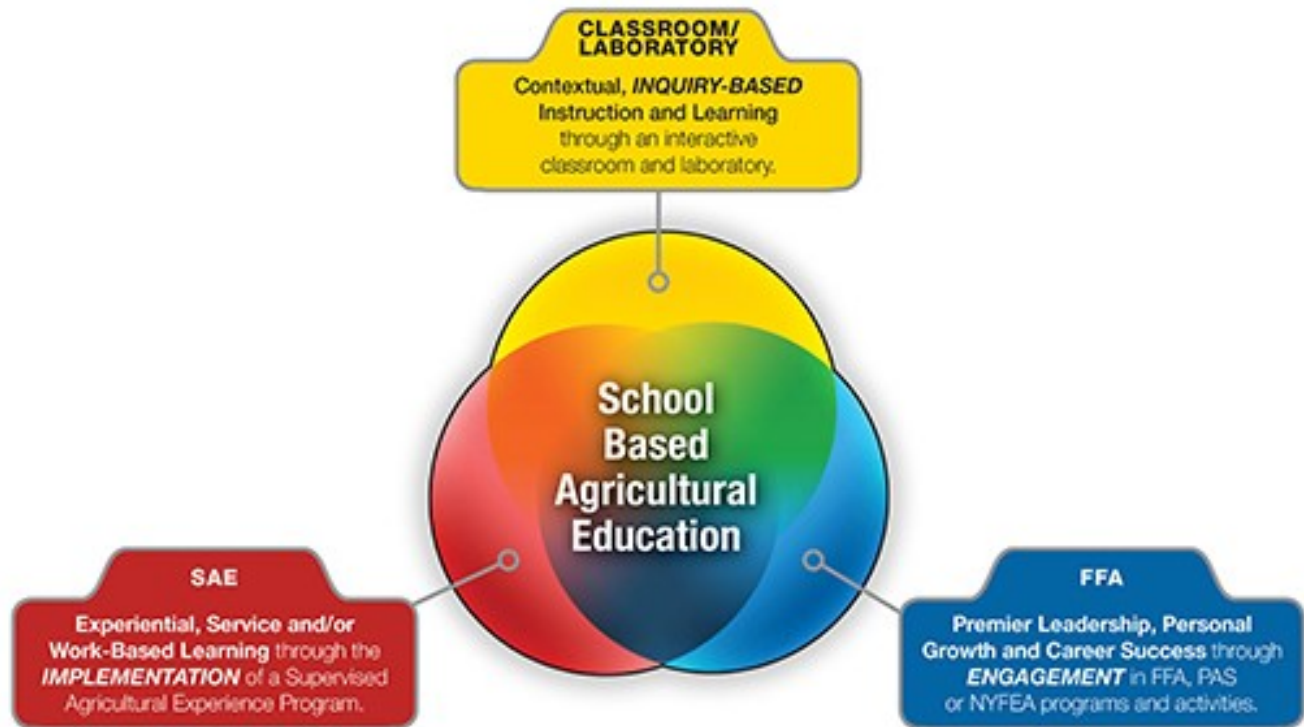

Supervised Agricultural Experience

Doing—Relevance

Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) is a **student-led, instructor-supervised, work-based learning experience** that results in **measurable outcomes** within a pre-determined, agreed upon set of **Agriculture, Food & Natural Resources (AFNR) Technical Standards and Career Ready Practices** aligned to your **Career Plan** of study.

An SAE Is

Aligned to Your Career Plan

SAEs are designed to grow and modify as students grow and develop students skills and identify new interests that may affect the students Career Plan.

Student-Led

Students will be the primary decision maker throughout their SAE. Many options may be shared with students by your instructor and other supporting adults, but the student ultimately has control.

Instructor Supervised

Students agricultural education instructor will help guide and foster growth within students SAE as needed. They serve as a SAE mentor.

Connected to Agriculture

No matter what type of SAE students choose, it need to be agriculturally-related. Students can choose to experience any of the AFNR career pathways.

Work-Based Learning

Depending on the type of SAE students select, students work-based experience could be in or out of school.

Measurable

Because SAEs are connected to agriculturally – based knowledge and skills students growth can be measured as a graded component of the students agricultural coursework.
