Summer is winding down and we are less than a month from the start of school. Hopefully, everyone has had a great summer and has had time to get away to enjoy the summer months. This year we are going to mail the student handbooks to all the families. Each family will receive one copy of the student handbook in the mail. There will be enough copies of the required signature pages for each student. All signature pages are due back to the office by Monday, August 19th, 2019. If you would need additional copies of the handbook or signature pages, please notify the office and a copies will be available for you.

The following is a list of notable handbook and policy changes that were board approved over the summer.

Student Handbook Changes of note:

- If a student is sent home from school with a fever/vomiting/diarrhea, the student must stay home for at least 24 hours and be free of the fever/vomiting/diarrhea for 24 hours before returning to school.
- Requests to be dropped off at a point, not on the regular route will not be accommodated, unless extenuating circumstances arise and the request is approved by the transportation director or administration. The parents/guardians will be notified by the transportation director at the beginning of the year before school starts where the place of pickup and drop-off will be for the student(s) to determine the normal daily route. If parents/guardians have two residences, they will be allowed to put down both residences as pickup and drop-off locations. Notification of the change will need to be given to the transportation director and office staff personnel. This transportation notice must be done via email by 1:00 PM each day to maywood.transportation@maywoodtigers.org. This is for the prior afternoon route or preceding morning route so that the drivers can be notified. The emails will be going to the transportation coordinator and all office staff personnel, so that appropriate messages can be delivered to bus drivers. If the requested change will alter bus routes, the district may refuse the request.
- Students must come to school dressed in clean, neat, and appropriate clothing to conform to educational standards. Students are prohibited from wearing the following attire:
 - Clothing displaying indecent, suggestive or profane writing, pictures or slogans
 - Clothing that advertises or displays alcohol, tobacco or any illegal substance
 - Caps, hats, and bandannas during the school day or at school-sponsored events
 - Bare feet (some type of footwear must be worn)
 - Short-shorts, biker shorts, or cutoffs
 - Hairstyles which distract from the learning process or the health and safety for either the student or others
 - Any clothing that could cause damage to others or school property
 - Spurs are not to be worn at school or school activities.
 - Clothing that is torn, ripped, or cut
 - Shirts, blouses, or other clothing worn unbuttoned, unzipped, or otherwise purposely unfastened
 - "Grubby clothes," those which are purposely torn or bedraggled or threadbare, dirty or disheveled
 - Costumes and/or those clothes intended only for leisure, entertaining or special occasions
 - Bare "midriff" (belly button) styles, see-through and low cut blouses, halters, tank tops or thin-strapped tops (spaghetti straps)
 - Pants and shorts worn below the waist so as to expose undergarments
 - Pants that drag on the floor
 - Chains hanging or attached to pants or shorts
 - Coats during school hours unless the student has permission from a faculty member
 - Clothing with tears or holes that expose flesh or underclothes

• Students who violate this policy will have their cell phones or other electronic devices confiscated immediately. The administration will return confiscated devices to the offending student's parent or guardian after meeting with the parent or guardian to discuss the violation. Students who violate this policy may, at the discretion of the school's administration, be subject to additional discipline, up to and including suspension or expulsion.

1st Offense, Cell Phone confiscated and returned at the end of the day

2nd Offense, Cell Phone confiscated and returned to parents/guardians upon visit with the principal

3rd Offense, Cell Phone confiscated and no cell phone allowed back in the building, on buses, or at school active ties

4th Offense, Cell Phone confiscated and cell phone returned to parents and students faces suspension or expulsion

The following are policies that were updated this summer and approved by the board of education. The following policies are notable in change.

Board Policy Changes

Policy # 3046-Animals at School. This policy has always allowed service animals in the building with proper documentation and animal control was followed. The policy has now added Section III about "Therapy Animals". It is stated as the following: III Therapy Animals

A "therapy animal" is an animal that has been individually trained and certified to work with its owner to provide emotional support, well-being, comfort, or companionship. Therapy animals are not "service animals" as that term is used in the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Therapy animals will not be allowed on school grounds or school property except as otherwise required by law.

Policy # 5045: Student Fees. School districts are no longer to be charging for technology fees since computers are required to complete daily educational tasks. The policy had Section V updated to state the following:

The district will provide students with the technological devices necessary to complete all basic curricular projects. As with all school property, students may be charged for damage to such devices.

Breakfast and Lunch Program

We encourage everyone to participate in the breakfast and lunch program as increased participation results in increased state and federal money available to our school. All accounts need to be paid in advance. Every month you will receive a statement of your account—please pay promptly. For your convenience Maywood Public Schools accepts Visa, MasterCard and Discover. Breakfast is served daily from 7:30 a.m. to 7:50 a.m. Breakfast prices are \$1.75 and the reduced price for breakfast is \$.30. There are no seconds for breakfast. Lunch prices are as follows: Preschool—\$2.65, K—5th grade \$2.90, 6th—12th \$3.15, Adults \$3.75 and reduced lunches are \$.40. Extra milk for lunch or milk break will be \$.50. Second helpings of the main dish and dessert are \$1.00 each. Your child's lunch account will be charged for any seconds taken, this includes those receiving free and reduced lunches. Fruits and vegetables are free. If you do not want your child to receive seconds, please call the school at 308-362-4223.

The Mission of TeamMates *is to positively impact the world by inspiring youth to reach their full potential through mentoring*. Established in 1991 by Tom and Nancy Osborne, TeamMates was formed in an effort to provide support and encouragement to all school-aged youth. The goal is to see young people graduate from high school and pursue a post-secondary education. TeamMates has touched the lives of thousands of youth and mentors across the Midwest. Right now, more than 10,200 matches are meeting in schools across Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Wyoming, and South Dakota.

The impact of the TeamMates match on the mentee and mentor is profound.

- 54% of mentees showed improved academic achievement after being matched with their mentor.
- 85% of mentors report they feel more hopeful after meeting with their mentee.
- 98% of mentees say they trust their mentor.
- More than 95% of mentees report that they are happy when they meet with their mentor, that their mentor talks to them about what they do well, they feel important when they are with their mentor and that they trust their mentor.

Data collection from Gallup's Clifton Strengths Project has helped affirm what TeamMates had already believed to be true:

- Strengths-based mentoring positively influences student engagement with school.
- Students in the control group who received no strengths training as part of their mentoring program were significantly less likely to strongly agree that they looked forward to seeing their mentor over time.
- There is a positive correlation between a student looking forward to seeing their mentor and overall levels of hope, engagement and well-being.

TeamMates has been recognized as a "Best Practice" mentoring organization which means the structure, policy and procedures are in place for a safe and consistent program. TeamMates adheres to the Elements of Effective Practice which were developed by the National Mentoring Partnership as the national standards for running a quality mentoring program.

To support a mentor/mentee match, it costs the TeamMates Mentoring Program approximately \$400 compared to the national average cost per match for mentoring programs of \$1,000 to \$2,000 per match. TeamMates is an effective and efficient mentoring organization due in part to its school-based match meeting venue, allowing for low -cost and in-kind support from participating school districts which keeps costs low.



TeamMates believes all children, no matter their life experience, can benefit from a relationship with a safe, caring adult. You don't have to be an expert. You just have to be there. Supervised Agricultural Experience

Doing—Relevance

Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) is a student-led, instructorsupervised, work-based learning experience that results in measurable outcomes within a predetermined, agreed upon set of Agriculture, Food & Natural Resources (AFNR) Technical Standards and Career Ready Practices aligned to your Career Plan of study.

An SAE Is

Aligned to Your Career Plan

SAEs are designed to grow and modify as students grow and develop students skills and identify new interests that may affect the students Career Plan.

Instructor Supervised

Students agricultural education instructor will help guide and foster growth within students SAE as needed. They serve as a SAE mentor.

Work-Based Learning

Depending on the type of SAE students select, students work-based experience could be in or out of school.

Student-Led

Students will be the primary decision maker throughout their SAE. Many options may be shared with students by your instructor and other supporting adults, but the student ultimately has control.

Connected to Agriculture

No matter what type of SAE students choose, it need to be agriculturally-related. Students can choose to experience any of the AFNR career pathways.

Measurable

Because SAEs are connected to agriculturally – based knowledge and skills students growth can be measured as a graded component of the students agricultural coursework.
