School has been back in session for a month and everyone has seemed to have gotten into a routine and is in school mode. The school year has been quite busy to start with a variety of activities and events going on at Maywood Public Schools. One major focal area across the state of Nebraska and the United States is school security. There has been far too many unfortunate incidents at schools in the recent years. The Nebraska Department of Education is well aware of this and is looking at making changes. There are many bills and mandates being looked at for schools to implement on school safety and security.

Here are at Maywood Public Schools, we are taking every step to ensure those steps are being met. The school district is in the process of making sure the district is in lockout mode at all times. What that means is, all perimeter doors are locked while school is in session. A security system is being installed on the front doors that has a camera and locking mechanism. The secretaries have a monitor on their desks and have the capabilities of allowing all visitors into the building once they hit the call button to the office. The secretaries have the capabilities of seeing who the visitor is on a monitor. One reminder, please make sure if you have elementary students in the one of the other buildings, you must check into the high school building first and the secretaries will help get you to your children in an orderly manner.

Lastly, we are participating in drills with our staff and students. Fire drills, lockdown drills, bus evacuations, and tornado drills will be done throughout the year. There may be other drills that are required along the way. We are taking all measures to make sure the students and staff are safe at Maywood Public Schools.

The first big task every year for schools is to get the budget completed. For the 18-19 fiscal year, a major challenge our district faced was the drop in land valuations across Frontier, Hayes, and Lincoln Counties. A year ago the Maywood School district had approximately \$366 million dollars of assessed valuation. This year, that number was down about 4% or approximately \$352 million dollars of assessed valuation.

The school board and administration had a special board meeting to make a few decisions on what to do with the levy without having to put more of a burden on the taxpayers of the district. Last year the levy was set at 0.819870 and this year with the increases in costs to run the school and the decrease in valuation, it was necessary to raise the levy. The levy was raised to 0.844533, this was an increase 0.024663 or a 3% increase on the levy. With valuations dropping as they did, the loss in revenue was not completely made up with the raise of the levy. Transfers to the depreciation fund were cut down and about \$.01 was taken out of the Special Building Fund and put into the General Fund to help offset the loss in revenue. Budgeting is tough for the board of education and they did a great job of working through the budgeting process and figuring out what the best needs were for the district.
